Item 5.1

Recommendation:

That the EFCL increase the administrative fee on each league membership sale from \$2 to \$5.

Report:

The EFCL has come to realize that it will need to increase its administrative fee on league membership sales quite significantly if it wants to cover the cost of managing this program.

Currently, we charge a \$2.00 administrative fee on the sale of each membership. Just over \$1.00 of this goes to Paypal (it has ranged from \$1.13 to \$1.28 in recent months), as it charges us 3.78% of the gross sale amount. This leaves less than \$1 for the EFCL, to help us cover our administrative costs.

An analysis of the federation's costs shows that in the first two months of this year, we would need to charge \$6 per card in order to break even. Most of our costs are in staff time, to help people purchase their card and ensure all of the card information and funds are transferred to the appropriate community league. In the first two months of this year Joanne has been spending about 25% of her work day on membership sales and Linda is spending about 20 hours/month. Barb also helps out periodically (an hour/week).

In addition, we believe it cost us about \$10,000 to establish the membership sales online program (which was not recovered) and another \$2,000 per year in maintenance costs/upgrades. This will include the addition of new postal codes as the city and number of leagues continue to grow.

Add it all up and our ongoing costs to administer this program are pushing \$30,000/year, based on sales of 6,000 cards per year. However, as noted above, our fee of \$1/card is only yielding \$6,000 in annual revenue, forcing us to take a loss of about \$24,000 or \$2,000/month on this program.

We believe there are some opportunities for us to shave our costs. For example, we are putting together a list of answers to commonly asked questions that will be posted on our website. We hope this will reduce some of our call volume. We are also encouraging leagues to sign up for online banking, which will make it easier for us to transfer funds to them.

We also believe that our calls to the office will go down, once buyers become more familiar with our new online membership sale program.

Consequently, we feel we should be able to fully recover our costs with a \$5 surcharge (as opposed to \$6). However, this will be reviewed again later in the year to see how it is working.

We also recognize that the first two months of this year were extraordinarily busy, due to soccer registrations. We feel this should settle down somewhat once the soccer season is underway.

However, it is also becoming apparent that online purchases are becoming an increasingly popular way of doing business. A growing number of people are quite prepared to pay a little extra for the convenience of getting their card without leaving home.

We also believe that our membership sales program, which became operational as part of our new website in October, is quite a bit easier to use than what we originally had in place. This helped cause the spike in online sales and will likely fuel more membership purchases in the future.

If this fee change is approved as recommended, the new charge would be tacked onto each membership sale immediately. Hence, it will be the customers who will cover the cost.

Another option would be for the EFCL to ask member leagues to cover some or all of the administrative fee. However, this would need to be approved by the leagues at a general meeting. As it has been our practice to notify leagues about a change in costs at one meeting and vote on the matter at the next meeting, this means that a vote would not be held until October. The federation would have spent another \$15,000 subsidizing this program by then.

Recommendation

That the EFCL inform the city budget office that it will submit a multi-year budget forecast once its growth strategy is complete.

Report:

In an attempt to forecast expenses well into the future, the city budget office has asked all of the city departments and external agencies – including the EFCL - to submit a three-year budget forecast (see the letter in correspondence). This would include estimates on all aspects of our operation, including salaries, programs and office rent.

Unfortunately, we do not have this information. In fact, it doesn't appear that the EFCL has ever been in a position to effectively estimate these costs, not having prepared multi-year budgets in the past.

This situation should change in another year or so, once we have completed our growth strategy. One of the key objectives of this strategy will be to determine how the organization will function over the next few years, complete with spending targets for all aspects of its operation. Consequently, we should be in a reasonably good position to provide a multi-year budget forecast by this time next year.

At this point, presentation of a multi-year budget is quite premature and would involve little more than guessing about future expenditures. It would also not reflect any input from our board or league members, which is extremely problematic, to say the least.

Hence, it is recommended that we inform the city that we are working toward a plan that will produce a multi-year budget in 2016.

Recommendation:

That the EFCL select members to serve on a committee charged with developing its growth strategy.

Report:

The EFCL is pleased to report that the City of Edmonton has approved our request to help fund the development of a growth strategy for our organization.

In a unanimous vote on Feb. 23, council's community services committee authorized an expenditure of \$39,000 on this exercise. The EFCL has pledged to match this amount, through cash (\$24,000) and in-kind support. This expenditure is already included in the federation's 2015 budget.

Funds will be used to hire a consultant who has extensive experience in dealing with larger non-profit organizations. It is our intention to review the manner in which these organizations finance, manage and govern their operations.

We will also use a portion of the money to cover administrative costs (meetings, minutes, materials, etc.) and will make office space available, if needed.

Board members on the committee will be asked to determine the composition of the committee, which will in turn finalize terms of reference for this project. These terms will need to be approved by the board of the EFCL, which will also be asked to approve the recommended growth strategy.

It should also be noted that the federation recently created a committee to negotiate a new partnership agreement with the City of Edmonton. As there will be a good deal of overlap in the mandate of these committees, the federation might want to consider placing one or more of the same people on each of these committees.

Lindsay Smith, Mark Nicholl, Rob Agostinis and Masood Makarechian (ex-officio) were appointed to the Partnership Committee.

Recommendation:

That the EFCL establish an Endowment Fund through the Edmonton Community Foundation (ECF) to help us cover the cost of maintaining and repairing our 100th Anniversary Project installation in Hawrelak Park.

Report:

What is an endowment fund?


An endowment fund is a fund where the principle, made up from donation gifts, is invested permanently for long term growth to provide a source of income, paid out annually, to a selected registered charity to be used for a charitable purpose.

How will the fund work?

By establishing this EFCL endowment fund for the 100th Anniversary Project, donors to our project will essentially be donating via ECF. The ECF has professional fund managers that manage those investments in perpetuity. The fund will grow. The interest income provided from the aggregated capital gifts to the fund will be annually paid out to the City of Edmonton. COE is the *qualified donee* that is eligible to receive the income proceeds (EFCL cannot) for the general charitable purpose of providing park enhancements that foster community league goals of gathering spaces, and specifically the maintenance and upkeep of the EFCL 100th Anniversary Project in Hawrelak Park as outlined in the EFCL and COE maintenance contract agreement.

Relevant Details.

- The EFCL 100th Anniversary Legacy Endowment Fund will be capped at \$150,000.
- Any further donations will go to a capital account that can be used to complete any portions of the project that we were unable to accommodate in our \$3.15 million project budget.
- ECF must have donations that build to \$10,000 as a minimum before the fund is operational.
- ECF will allow the fund to build via donations throughout our construction and the first year or two of operation before starting to pay out the annual income to COE.



The Fund Agreement

The EFCL goals were to:

- Offer tax receipts to donors of our project
- Establish a process that would provide the future resources necessary to ensure our project is well maintained and updated as we add community leagues.
- Eliminate any future financial obligations beyond 2021 or beyond the scope of what we have identified and agreed to.

Meetings were held with the City of Edmonton project liaisons Tannia Franke, Roger Jevne and COE legal counsel Margo Hoffner, along with Edmonton Community Foundation liaison Kathy Hawkesworth. Together we worked out what clauses were needed in the fund agreement, what were needed in the maintenance agreement, and the overall structure and process for how this would all work to ensure the EFCL goals were met, as well as our obligations to the EFC and COE.

The draft fund agreement is attached separately and the maintenance agreement are attached to this report.

The maintenance agreement outlines how the EFCL and COE will work together to ensure that the facility is properly looked after. However, it will not be completed and signed until after the 100th Anniversary project has been built in its entirety and all the actual "what was constructed" details are known.

Estimated Fundraising Timeline

March - The EFCL's 100th Anniversary Legacy Fund is approved, signed and placed on our website, in order to start receiving donations.

April – Overtures are made to EFCL board members, staff and key supporters to be the first to donate to the fund.

May – The fund is formally pitched to community league members & the general public (to be part of the \$100 Club).

June – The fund is featured at the EFCL Community League Showcase, in order to help raise awareness and collect donations.

Item 5.5

Recommendation:

That the EFCL establish a \$100 Club as a means of raising money for the 100th Anniversary Project and recognizing people who support the project.

Report:

Now that we have secured a method of providing tax receipts to individuals interested in making a donation to the 100th Anniversary Project, it is time to revisit the idea of the \$100 Club.

First conceived about two years ago, the club would provide an opportunity for many people to contribute to this project and be recognized in a meaningful way. Public recognition would include a posting and regular updates on our website, our 100th Anniversary Project advertising materials and EFCL annual reports – to name three - as well as repeated references at EFCL events like the upcoming Community League Showcase.

Funds collected by \$100 Club donors has always been seen as a significant component of the fundraising that the EFCL committed to undertake to help finance the 100th Anniversary Project. As stated in our budget and various presentations to city council and others, the federation is committed to raising a total of \$600,000, to match the city's donation as well as the amount we are asking from both the provincial and federal government.

To date, the federation has secured a commitment of \$314,000 from the leagues and has contributed about \$100,000 from its own resources. This means we need to raise \$186,000, of which we are hoping to obtain \$150,000 from \$100 Club donations and \$36,000 from fundraising events.

We are hoping to kick off the \$100 Club fundraising efforts with donations from board and staff, followed shortly by a public launch around May 1. The promotion will also be featured at both our Annual General Meeting in May and at our Community League Showcase on June 10. It is our hope that leagues will cover the \$100 cost for key volunteers that they would like to see recognized in perpetuity.

Creation of a \$100 Club was first recommended to the board by the 100th Anniversary Committee in April, 2013. The committee selected the figure of \$100 to connect with our 100th Anniversary, as well as to accommodate a large number of donors who would be able to afford a donation of this amount. It is our hope that thousands of people will donate to the fund, which would be in keeping with the way community leagues do many things.

The EFCL board of directors liked the concept, but didn't want to approve it until we had sorted out how we might provide tax receipts to each of the donors.

That has now been resolved by the creation of the 100th Anniversary Project Legacy Fund. As detailed in a separate report, this fund will be used to help finance the ongoing maintenance and repair of the facility. The fund will be managed by the Edmonton Community Foundation and capped at \$150,000. If additional funds are collected, they will go toward project features that cannot be accommodated within the \$3.15 million budget.

Item 5.6

Recommendation:

That future board meeting agendas be adjusted so that some items are dealt with once every two months, on a rotating basis.

Report:

It has become quite apparent that we need to make some changes to our board agenda packages.

Meetings are rarely ending at the stated time of adjournment (10:00 p.m.). In fact, some recent meetings have continued to 11:00 p.m., which is much too late in the evening for everyone involved.

Even then, the board is having a difficult time dealing with all of the matters effectively. District updates from board members are often skipped over, in the interest of saving time. Similarly, many staff reports and the information report from the City of Edmonton are rarely exempted for discussion, again due to time constraints.

This is not a good situation. A lot of work goes into preparing and presenting these reports, which we don't want to see wasted. And the board can be left with the feeling that it isn't devoting the time it would like to on many of these matters.

As mentioned in the past, it is our hope to restructure the way our organization works, so that more items can be delegated to a smaller group of people (perhaps an executive committee). That is one of the key issues we want to explore in our growth strategy.

However, as an interim measure, we could simply adjust our agenda package to better fit the time we have available each month.

As can be seen in the attached example, we could designate some items as topics that we deal with every month. This would include the decision items, which are typically timely issues that require board direction. We would also include meeting minutes, correspondence, the City of Edmonton's report, work-in-progress, board motions and in-private matters as items that would appear on every agenda.

Other parts of the agenda could be rotated, so that they only appear every two months.

For example, we could include on one list presentations from partner organizations, board member reports and district updates from board members. On the other list, which would be dealt with on alternate meeting dates, would be all of the EFCL staff reports.

As a footnote to this discussion, the EFCL shouldn't view a heavy agenda as a bad thing. In fact, full agendas are a reflection of an active organization that is involved in many activities and is working hard to properly assist and represent its member leagues.

However, it is also apparent that we need to reorganize our meetings so that they are manageable for everyone involved.

The following is a sample of how the agenda might be divided. This is the agenda the board dealt with last November. Items in black would be dealt with every month. Items in yellow and items in red would be dealt with every second month, on a rotating basis.

Item 5.7

Recommendation:

That the EFCL provide a letter of support for the naming of a small park after Don Williams, a former EFCL president.

Report:

The EFCL has recently been contacted by a former EFCL president, Bud Squair, who is attempting to get the City of Edmonton to name a small park on the south side of 106 Avenue, between 106 and 107 Street, after Don Williams (see letter in correspondence).

Don served as president of the EFCL in the mid-1980s. He then went on to sit as a trustee with the Edmonton Public School Board for 18 years. He was also very involved with Victoria High School, including a stint as chairman of its 75th Anniversary Celebration.

According to the note from Mr. Squair, Central McDougall Community League and the Edmonton Public School Board have both endorsed the idea of naming a park after Don. Given Don's commitment to our organization, it is appropriate that we do the same.

Our recommendation and that from other organizations will be considered by the city's Names Advisory Committee, which is a council-appointed group of citizens charged with naming streets, parks and other landmarks after people who have made a significant contribution to our city.

Recommendation:

Report:

Following a recommendation from the board, the EFCL has selected the evening of June 10 for its Community League Showcase.

KIDS SPORTS EDMONTON

Infill Debate in Hyper Mode

A good portion of my time was also spent responding to individual league inquiries about amendments regarding Garage and Garden Suite and RF1 Subdivisions, Height Regulations and the potential rezoning of all RF1 lots to RF3.

I attended meetings of leagues discussing these changes, and assisted with the development of neighbourhood surveys to help leagues understand what residents desire with regards to infill.

Building Height

The most time was spent on the Height amendments. With input from the Planning Committee I prepared a Height Amendment Worksheet and illustrations for leagues to help them understand the amendments, the implications and the potential recommendations to consider in their feedback to City Council. I also managed to convince the Sustainable Development Department to do some community consultation. As a result, the city organized an Open House on March 4th which was fairly well attended by league people, but few others. A newsletter/web article was written to explain the complex Height amendment changes.

The EFCL Planning and Development Committee prepared some suggestions on the Height regulations. Tyler McNab, District D representative, will be presenting the recommendations to Executive Committee of Council on March 24th. Here is the letter that was prepared:

March 7, 2015

Dear Honourable Mayor and Councillors,

The EFCL Planning and Development Committee has reviewed a variety of drafts of Height and Grade amendments and the Committee has analyzed the impact of Bylaws 16733 and 17062 in some detail. The Committee would like to offer comments on some amendments, but is reserving any comments on other items, at least until there is further input from community leagues.

Our main concerns are with mature neighbourhoods, established neighbourhoods which are beginning redevelopments and new neighbourhoods which have not yet been fully developed. We are less concerned about future greenfield sites which tend to have developer controls in place to ensure compatible buildings.

The EFCL Planning Committee would like to make the following suggestions at this time:

1. Maintain a maximum ridge height.

At present the Height of a building is measured as the vertical distance between Grade and the mid-point of the roof. We are pleased that measuring to the midpoint has been maintained because this encourages a variety of roof types and reduces massing.

The current definition of Height sets the distance of the ridge line or peak of the roof to no more than 1.5 m above the maximum permitted height of the roof midpoint.

The proposed amendments eliminate the maximum ridge/peak height. This dramatically increases the potential ridge height.

For instance, a semi-bungalow in a mature neighbourhood can presently have a roof extending to a height of (8.6 m to midpoint +1.5m=) 10.1 m at the top ridge; whereas with the proposed amendment the ridge could extend to 13.2 m – a full storey higher (See attached diagram). More dramatically, an A-frame building in a mature neighbourhood could have a peak over 16 m in Height.

We strongly recommend that a maximum ridge height be maintained in order to create some certainty as to how high roofs can extend. The maximum ridge height could be increased but there has not been any discussion of what that number could be.

Another option is to create contextual roof ridge heights with a range of roof ridge heights being possible. The roof ridge limit within the range would be determined by the average roof ridge height of the adjacent buildings. Calgary uses this method. A contextual ridge height method could be very useful in infill situations where it is important to take the context into consideration.

It is our understanding that greenfield developers have been wanting to remove the ridge height limit so that higher, steeper roofed housing could be built in some new subdivisions with steep roof architectural controls. Perhaps a unique zone for these greenfield areas would solve their problem.

2. Consider measuring mansard roof heights to the roof deck.

Mansard roofs are very similar in mass to flat roof buildings, thus should be measured in the same way. Other cities, such as Ottawa measure mansard roofs to the deck rather than to the roof midpoint.

3. Keep the 14 m maximum height of low rise apartments (RA7) when next to lower buildings.

Increasing heights of apartments from 14 m to 16 m will increase massing, shadowing and to some extent wind. However, this additional height may be fine when next to buildings which are at least 14 m in height. We would want to view sun shadow studies prior to making any additional comments about height increases.

4. Maintain Sections 814.3(14) and (16) of the Mature Neighbourhood Overlay (MNO) until a review of the MNO has been completed.

This would allow interrelated zoning regulations to be considered at the same time, and would provide opportunities to consider a variety of scenarios.

Thank you for your attention to our initial suggestions.

EFCL Planning Committee letter to Council on Garage and Garden Suites

Councillor Bryan Anderson expressed an interest in hearing from EFCL directly rather than hearing our perspective via Administration, thus the Committee was inspired to submit our one suggestion regarding Garden Suite amendments. Here is the note submitted:

Dear Mayor and City Councillors,

RE: March 16, 2015 Public Hearing Item 7.2 – Garage and Garden Suites

The EFCL Planning and Development Committee has one suggestion for an amendment to Bylaw 17116.

We suggest that Garage and Garden Suites be allowed to be higher than the principal Dwelling on the condition there are mature trees in the front or rear yard to buffer the view of the Garage Suite from the front street.

The higher Garage Suites are always visible from the sidewalk across the street. The tall Garage Suites can give the appearance of one massive building on the lot. Tall trees would break up this massing effect. Virtually every mature yard has mature trees, thus all that would be requested is that the trees be maintained. This condition would help encourage the property owner to retain those mature trees thus keeping the neighbourhood character despite additional infill. It is a win/win for all.

Retaining mature trees is a key recommendation in the Residential Infill Guidelines, but to date absolutely nothing has been done to incorporate the retention of mature trees into the Zoning Bylaw. Here is an easy opportunity.

Please consider this modest amendment with positive benefits for property owners and the neighbourhood.

Saving Heritage and Neighbourhood Character

Heritage groups have been very active in the last few months. They are worried that the rush for infill housing will cause many of the heritage buildings and residential character streets to be destroyed. As an EFCL representative, I participated on the Heritage Forward Panel discussion on March 2nd, along with a city Heritage Planner, Heritage architect, and a major developer. Over 100 people were in attendance for the lively dis

To recap our intentions, sorting through 100 years of community legacy to distill the elements needed to tell our story beautifully in Hawrelak Park - requires expertise. We applied for funding to hire a historical research contract staff whose role it will be to conduct research, seek out and compile data, organize the collection, and arrange for the communication and display of that story. We want it to be compelling. History is captivating when depicted creatively with engaging words and visual art and it is our responsibility to honour that story by relating it in the most engaging way possible. We are now fully funded for this contract staff and we can reconvene the 100 Story committee to begin the hiring process.

2. Board Leadership Conference March 21

EFCL is part of a coalition of non-profits, local entrepreneurs, and City and Government of Alberta administrative units who host the annual Board Leadership Conference. The Conference (#blyeg for short) is similar to Leagues Alive, but for all Capital Region non-profits.

This year the conference is happening on March 21 at MacEwan University. Registration is \$130/person. This year’s keynote speaker is Michael Phair.

I will be leading a session this year called ‘Understanding the Connections Between Your Board and Your Membership.’

3. New Resource Priorities Update

I’m keeping a list of resources that leagues would find useful, including those developed by the EFCL and other organizations. This will include topics that didn’t ‘make the cut’ for Leagues Alive 2014. Here are the ones we’re prioritizing.

- **Social Media & Storytelling:** Resources complete! Planning a new run of workshops to catch any leagues that missed the winter availability, and to see if spring affects attendance.
- **AGLC Use of Proceeds:** ECVO has offered to reschedule their cancelled presentation from Leagues Alive as a standalone session. We are in contact with GAIN to set a date for a workshop sometime in the late spring.

- **Tri-Partite License Agreement Refresher:** I'm working on a proposal to develop some plain language resources to help leagues apply the Tri-Partite Agreement. We'll be discussing the development of that resource with City Administration to make sure that all signatories are comfortable with the proposed language and format.
- **Electronic Voting Procedure:** Conducting votes via email and social media is an emerging field in parliamentary procedure. Many leagues are using e-votes without having appropriate procedures in place. I've started research on best practices from other organizations and hope to put out a resource on it later this year.
- **Access to Information Requests from Members:** I've seen a spike in the number of leagues receiving requests to inspect their records from members. All leagues allow for members to inspect their records in their bylaws, but not many have procedures in place that clarify how those requests are handled. Privacy law isn't one of my areas of expertise, but I'm looking into whether other organizations like ECVO or Volunteer Alberta have applicable resources.
- **Leagues as Employers:** In the 2014 WGM Survey results, it became apparent that an increasing number of leagues employ paid staff of some kind. We hosted a session at Leagues Alive in 2013, but a one shot seminar isn't going to be enough to help leagues make the transition to employer. I haven't made contact yet, but I intend to reach out to the provincial government and to WCB to see if they have any educational resources or could refer me to the right place.

4. Sector Coordination: Governance Support for Non-profits

ECVO has started a conversation between non-profits and government partners about good governance and board development in the sector. I attended the preliminary meeting of the group on behalf of EFCL. The conversation was rich and lively. ECVO is currently spear-heading a number of smaller working groups who will dig into what we discussed, and will bring the larger group back together later in the year for a more detailed discussion.

The big thing coming out of that discussion that EFCL should be aware of right now is the publication of a Discussion Paper on Changing the legal framework for Societies & Non-profit Corporations by the Alberta Law Reform Institute. I haven't dug through the report yet, but it's available online here: <http://www.alri.ualberta.ca/index.php/publications/report-for-discussion-non-profit-corporations>. The ALRI is proposing some extremely significant changes to the *Societies Act* and the *Corporations Act* that have the potential to fundamentally change how Alberta non-profits are regulated.

ECVO and a company called Trisula Solutions co-hosted a 'lunch and learn' for board governance practitioners in February which was extremely informative, not to mention a great opportunity to meet some other board development professionals and non-profit leaders, not to mention a great opportunity to learn more about 'pracademia' and the room for growth in Alberta's non-profit sector around scholarship in non-profit governance and leadership. I look forward to the next session.

We will be sending you out templates to complete your funding requests for 2016-2018 so that we can enter them into COBS on your behalf. Internal deadlines will be set in the next email, so that there is sufficient time for us to enter your information by the deadline.

I am also attaching a copy of the 2016-2018 Business Plan Instructions for your reference. As the only submission required is the updating of COBS, the relevant pages are pages 13-17.

The template along with 2016-2018 cost assumptions for the business plan will be sent in March or earlier depending on when they are released.

TITLE: **Multi-year Budgeting Policy**

Policy Statement:

1. The City shall undertake a multi-year approach to budgeting for operating and capital programs and services unless otherwise directed by Council.
2. The end of the term of the multi-year budget is to be coincidental with the calendar year end of the year after the year in which a new Council is elected. The term of the multi-year budget is to be approved by Council.
3. City Council expects the implementation of a multi-year budget will allow for the identification of longer term funding needs for the achievement of Council approved outcomes.
4. City Council expects that the public will be afforded an opportunity to comment on the proposed multi-year budget through a non-statutory public hearing.
5. City Council expects multi-year resource planning to consider the best estimates for all revenues available to the City and the best estimates of expenditure for established service levels and for the operating budget to provide indicative property tax impacts for each year of the multi-year budget.
6. Multi-year budgets are to be managed, monitored and reported upon.
7. City Council expects that adjustments to the multi-year budget that exceed the City Manager's delegated authority will be discussed in public and approved by City Council.

The purpose of this policy is to:

Establish guidelines and the approach for the planning and approval of multi-year budgets to ensure greater certainty for future expenditures and revenue increases and the related impact on future tax increases. The Policy provides direction in the development, approval and adjustment of multi-year budgets in order to recognize major changes in budgetary assumptions, legislation and Council priorities.

This policy is subject to any specific provisions of the Municipal Government Act or other relevant legislation or Union Agreement.
