**Item 5.1**

### **Recommendation:**

**That the EFCL Executive Committee prepare a board recruitment strategy for the board's consideration.**

### **Report:**

The EFCL currently has three vacancies on the board of directors, in districts C (Clareview/Horse Hills), F (downtown) and G (Alberta Avenue East). The District C position has been vacant for about three years, the District F position for six months and the District G position for about two years.

In addition, it appears that we may be faced with additional turnover at the spring Annual General Meeting, as some board members have indicated that they may retire at that time.

With this in mind, it would be prudent to develop a board recruitment strategy, so the federation isn't facing a serious shortage of directors next spring.

The recruitment strategy could include the following:

1. Creation a nominating committee
2. Development of a promotional campaign to attract new directors.
3. Bylaw amendments, to make it easier to elect directors and possibly appoint directors on an interim basis to fill temporary vacancies.

It is recommended that the Executive Committee bring forward a strategy this winter, in order for it to be put into practice before the May 25 Annual General Meeting.

### News From The City Of Edmonton EFCL Board Meeting, December 10, 2015



**THE WAY WE LIVE:** Supports the 10-year Goal - *Improve Edmonton's Livability*

#### Summer Temporary Employment Program (STEP)

As part of the recent 2016-18 Operating Budget deliberations, City Council inquired how the reinstatement of the Summer Temporary Employment Program (STEP) will affect the Green Shack program.

City Administration provided the following response:

The provincial government has indicated \$10 million per year, for the next two years, will be allocated to STEP. Previously, \$7.1 million was allocated to STEP. Indications are the program will commence in 2016.

At this stage, the individual funding level and eligibility criteria is unknown. If similar STEP funding and eligibility criteria is applied, then City Administration anticipates similar levels of past funding could support the Green Shack program.

Previous STEP funding was \$255,000 in 2012 (approximately \$3,000 per program site). However, if criteria or eligibility rules have changed then it is currently unknown whether any funding can or will be used to support the Green Shack program.

If it turns out that the Green Shack program will be eligible for STEP, the City would hope to utilize those available funds.

#### Meet the City's new Community Infill Panel

Thirteen members have been chosen from almost 70 applications to sit on the City's newly formed [Community Infill Panel](#).

The panel brings a new approach to engaging Edmontonians in advancing infill. As a volunteer advisory committee, the panel will provide strategic advice to City Administration on key infill issues.

### **EFCL’s Budget Request Approved**

The EFCL is pleased to report that its budget request of \$563,000 has been approved by Edmonton City Council. This represents an inflationary increase of \$10,000 to our base operating grant of \$537,500, along with \$15,000 for staff development and other core services.

This will give us some flexibility in the preparation of our 2016 budget.

It should be noted that the federation has also been allotted a 2% inflationary increase for the years 2017 and 2018, in the city’s three year budget forecast. This may or may not line up with the EFCL’s multi-year growth strategy, which should be finalized this spring.

### **Gaming and Liquor Revenues Down**

Casino, liquor and restaurant owners are reporting significant declines in revenues this year, due to the slumping provincial economy.

Stakeholders at last month’s AGLC meeting reported that the declines were most severe in Fort McMurray and other small to mid-size Alberta communities, with Calgary not far behind. It appears Edmonton has been insulated to a significant degree by the presence of the provincial government. Banff and Jasper have both fared well due to an increase in international tourism.

Casino operators have noticed a 4% drop in revenues overall, while liquor and food sales are down 5-15 % in many locations.

In other news, the AGLC reported that it is still assembling the results from the June survey on extended casino hours. Early results showed the increase in hours lead to an increase in revenues, although this has since been obliterated by the effects of a sluggish economy.

The AGLC also reported that it has set up a special task force to deal with money laundering at casinos and is studying the manner in which marijuana sales have been introduced in other jurisdictions in case it is legalized here.

It is also looking into the possibility of installing bingo kiosks in stores and an online poker gaming site as ways to generate additional revenue.

### **Playground Development Meeting Set**

City of Edmonton staff will be meeting with EFCL staff and board members at 10:00 a.m., Tuesday, December 15, to discuss the new playground development rules that go into effect on January 1. This will include the manner in which leagues can select a turn-key playground or develop a custom-designed model.

The EFCL will explore the manner in which leagues can still affect the type of playground that they want installed, which has been a concern expressed by some leagues and playground suppliers.

## **Rink Operations Workshop Ready to Go**

The EFCL is hosting a rink operations workshop for all community league rink managers, supervisors, social and program directors. It will be held at Killarney Community League (8720-130 A Ave.) from 6-8 p.m., on Wednesday, Dec. 9.

Topics to be covered include: setting up a pond hockey program, developing a learn-to-skate program, hosting multiple rink events throughout the season and the ins and outs of staffing.

We are pleased to have representatives from Bonnie Doon, Britannia Youngstown and North Glenora community leagues making the presentations. In addition, there will be a demonstration by Killarney on the use of a Zamboni to clear and maintain their rink ice.

## **EFCL Continues to Explore Charitable Status For Leagues**

The EFCL is working with the City of Edmonton on the pros and cons of leagues obtaining charitable status. The issue is receiving heightened attention now that Strathearn Community League has received charitable status for its building society. It did so to raise funds for a new community hall.

The federation wants to know if that option is preferable to the league obtaining charitable status for itself.

## **Negotiations Continue with Re:Sound**

EFCL Assistant Director Joanne Booth has been meeting with Re:Sound to see if a deal can be worked out to cover the tariffs owed by community leagues that hold events where music is played.

Re:Sound has suggested that the leagues would pay a yearly fee, based on the capacity of their hall and that the EFCL would collect the fee and remit the payment. Re:Sound has proposed a blanket rate for all events and wants the first payment to cover 2014 and 2015, with the 2016 payment due by January 31, 2017.

The EFCL has stated that it would have to be reimbursed for its time and any non-payment by leagues if it was to act as the collection agent. We have not taken a position on any of the other suggested terms.

## **Mature Neighbourhood Overlay Workshops A Success**

A total of 47 leagues flagged a series of topics they want the city to address during the EFCL's Mature Neighbourhood Overlay Workshops in November. They also felt the visual graphics prepared by a local architect for the workshops were most helpful. A more formal participant evaluation is forthcoming.

In other news the EFCL is working closely with city planners and interested leagues on proposed **amendments to the city's zoning bylaw**. These include changes to the setbacks in the RF3 zone,

changes to the location and size of private outdoor amenity (leisure) spaces, privacy regulations, and strategies to promote the retention of private residential trees. The EFCL Planning Committee has analyzed the proposed changes and has had significant influence on the drafts. We are particularly happy with the possibility that some of EFCL's family-friendly guidelines regarding amenity spaces may be incorporated into the zoning bylaw.

In addition, the **EFCL Construction Issues Committee** presented its report and recommendations to Council's Executive Committee in October. To our delight, nearly all the major recommendations were adopted. Bev continues to work with the City's Construction Issues Committee to implement new practices. The EFCL Construction Committee and Bev have prepared an educational article which will be distributed to leagues in January.

Finally, Bev is working with the Community Leadership Group on Council's Initiative on Public Engagement, while EFCL volunteer Fred Mitchell is with the Visions, Framework, Policy Group and EFCL volunteer Karen Zypchyn is on the Evaluation, Report, Recognition Group. Our work began in November.

## **100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Project Ground Breaking and Fundraising Date Set!**

**Saturday, April 30<sup>th</sup> 2016** is now confirmed as the date of our Spring Fundraising Event and Ground Breaking Ceremony for our 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Project in Hawrelak Park.

We intend to include a People Power 5k and 10k run, along with a 1k and 3k walk, as the featured component of the fundraiser.

Planning of the event, which will need lots of volunteers, is now underway.

In addition, the project marketing committee is developing a list of ways they would like the city to help promote our anniversary project. It plans to bring these ideas to the project steering committee, which will make recommendations to the board in the new year.

## **Servus Links Arms with the EFCL**

The EFCL is pleased to report that Servus Credit Union has just signed up for another three year term as one of our key corporate sponsors. Servus was one of the first companies to sign up as a corporate sponsor when this program was initiated three years ago.

## **Skating Rink Contest a Hit**

Our recent "Who will be the 1<sup>st</sup> to Open?" rink contest generated a lot of publicity and enthusiasm around one of Canada's oldest traditions. And as one newspaper daily stated, our contest, "could only happen in Edmonton."

Given that we were not expecting to see any results until mid-December, we were surprised to not only see the first rink open on Nov. 20, but that it was on a grass-based surface (where it takes much more water to make the ice).

Grandview Heights Community League was our winner. They sent in their email at 8:08 pm on the 20<sup>th</sup>. Crestwood also opened on the evening of the 20<sup>th</sup>, but they did not send in their email until Nov. 21 at 8:48am. Grabbing 3<sup>rd</sup> place was Strathearn, which opened on Nov. 27 (7:13 pm), followed by Kilkenny on Nov. 28 (8:16pm).

The contest and the results received publicity from our media friends across the board: radio, TV and print, plus there was a lot of help promoting and sharing out the results on social media. From an awareness standpoint, this was a very successful campaign that required very little effort to produce. The Grandview Heights celebratory Community Skating Rink Party hosted by the EFCL, will take place Sunday, Jan. 10, 2016 from 3pm to 6pm.

## EFCL Walking/Poling Program Approved

The EFCL is pleased to report that it has received a grant of \$46,305 for its **Community Walk Program**. This project will offer 20 community leagues an opportunity to buy equipment and offer a walking program in their neighborhood. All they need to do is deliver two demonstration sessions and assign a champion and assistant program director (preferably an adult and a youth).

The EFCL will advertise the program, organize one central training session by a certified urban poling instructor for all identified champions and assistants as well as establish a schedule of two sessions for each of the 20 community leagues to deliver urban poling classes by the certified instructor at a neighbourhood location. We will also offer a refresher course at the completion of the community sessions, to maintain the momentum as well as monitor and obtain feedback.

The objectives of the one-year project are to help individuals get to know each other, get active, use local resources and amenities, build community and awareness of the natural environment.
