#### **INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT**

To the Members of Edmonton Federation of Community Leagues Edmonton, Alberta

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Edmonton Federation of Community Leagues, which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2016, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

#### Management's Responsibly for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

#### Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Edmonton Federation of Community Leagues as at December 31, 2016, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### **DECEMBER 31, 2016**

#### 1. NATURE OF ORGANIZATION

The Edmonton Federation of Community Leagues (the "Federation") was established in 1921 and, as a non-profit organization, is exempt from income taxes. The Federation exists to continually improve the efficiency and effectiveness of member organizations in their effort to deliver community programs, by providing leadership as well as operational and administrative support.

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of Presentation

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations.

Cash

Cash includes chequing and savings accounts and petty cash amounts that are readily converted into known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant change in value.

#### Tangible Capital Assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided over the estimated useful lives of the assets at the following methods and rates:

#### Revenue Recognition

The Federation follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions, which include donations, casino funds and government grants. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue during the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Restricted investment income is recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted investment income is recognized as revenue when earned.

Membership dues are recognized as revenue in the year to which they relate.

Investment income is recognized as revenue when earned.

#### Contributed Services

The Federation is dependent on the voluntary services of many individuals. The value of these donated services is not recognized in the financial statements due to the difficulty of determining their fair value.

#### Measurement Uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the recorded amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Significant areas requiring the use of management's estimates include the useful lives of tangible capital assets and the corresponding rates of amortization and the amount of accrued liabilities. All estimates are reviewed periodically and adjustments are made to the statement of revenues and expenditures as appropriate in the year they become known.

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued) <u>Financial Instruments</u>

#### Measurement of financial instruments

The Federation initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value and subsequently measures all financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash and accounts receivable.

Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

Impairment

Financial assets measured at cost are tested for impairment when there are indicators of impairment. The amount of the write-down is recognized in the statement of revenues and expenditures. The previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement, directly or by adjusting the allowance account, provided it is no greater than the amount that would have been reported at the date of the reversal had the impairment not been recognized previously. The amount of the reversal is recognized in the statement of revenues and expenditures.

#### 3. CASH

Cash received from casino, government grant funding and members totalling \$819,671 (2015 - \$869,879) are restricted for use in accordance with the terms of the related agreements.

As a result, the items that are over 2-3% of the original budget might become more inline after the amendments are made. However, this amended budget would need to be approved by the board members before being finalized. MG also recommend that the 3% rule should be removed from the bylaws. It should be changed to 10%, which is more reasonable, and moved into board policy.

## **Recommendation A:**

That the EFCL take the counter-offer from SOCAN to the membership for discussion at the Annual General Meeting in May.

## **Recommendation B:**

That the EFCL contact SOCAN to let them know that the proposal presented by the EFCL is the only alternate solution acceptable to the leagues and so we do not accept their counter-offer and we shall continue with the status quo.

Background:

We have had a conference call from SOCAN responding to our offer.

Our offer was for leagues with a hall capacity >150 would pay \$50 and halls <150 would pay \$100. The EFCL would retain \$25 from each transaction for administration and would remit \$25 and \$75 respectively.

They pointed out that leagues are currently covered under Tariff 21, which is already a special tariff for community leagues. Under this tariff leagues pay \$195 each. <u>This also includes detailed reporting</u>.

They have talked to their legal department and feel they cannot apply Tariff 58 or 15A.

They have countered our proposal by offering an arrangement under Tariff 8, which would be for an organization that had 3 events per year and is based on hall capacity as follows:

- 1 to 100 seats would be \$123.39 per year
- 101 to 300 seats would be \$177.61
- 300 to 500 seats would be \$370.14

If Tariff 8 were to be implemented, SOCAN <u>would not require the detailed reporting</u>, that is currently in place.

We thanked them for calling back, pointed out that the board would need to decide if this should go back to the membership.

## **100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Update**

We have been working with USL and the City of Edmonton regarding the tender package. There have been a few issues with administration and their legal department regarding how the tender can go forward. We have met several times and found solutions to these issues. The re-worked tender package should go to the City of Edmonton for final review by April 13, 2017.

## Neighbour to Neighbour Campaign

April 7 was our deadline for Neighbour to Neighbour Campaign applications. Twenty eight applications were submitted. Since this is a pilot project our selection will not be random. Rather, we will be selecting a variety of different leagues based on varied criteria: size of area, estimated number of current members, area of the city, etc.

At the time of this writing, we had chosen 2 of 10 pilot areas for Neighbour to Neighbour Campaign so the Operations and Membership Senior Director could begin mapping.

## **Edmonton Mennonite Centre for Newcomers**

Erick Abatman and the Executive Director met to discuss our programming and how we can work together. We have uncovered some areas where we can work closely: recruitment for our Leadership Training Program (for women and girls), volunteer recruitment to assist at league events, co-applying for grants using the EMCN charitable status.

EMCN is also opening an office with other service providers next to the Giant Tiger on Victoria Trail on the Northside and is planning on reaching out to the 4 leagues in the area: Hairsine, Bannerman, Fraser and South Clareview.

## **Pixel Blue**

Pixel Blue created all of our GNR collateral. They have also taken on two projects for us this semester. The animation class will be developing a short animation for the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Project. The design class has agreed to do a logo and branding for the Green Leagues program.

## Green Leagues Kick-Off

We will be holding a Kick-Off for Green Leagues on May 3 at Evansdale. Councillor Michael Walters (who started the Green League Challenge in 2009) will be the keynote speaker. David Dodge (member of the Committee and Chair, Energy Efficiency Alberta) has been asked to introduce him. Charlotte Grandy will also speak about the program.

#### Re: Letter of Support for the Edmonton and Area Land Trust

To Whom It May Concern:

Please accept this letter of support for the Edmonton and Area Land Trust (EALT). The EFCL is the representative and coordinating body for Edmonton's 157 community leagues. As an umbrella organization, EFCL offers programs and services to its member community leagues, and advises leagues on a wide variety of topics, from governance to local programming to land development.

Just as the EFCL represents a unison of voices, we respect the fact that the EALT was created by a partnership of entities, including the City of Edmonton, the Edmonton Community Foundation, and various local groups, and that they have continued with a partnership-based approach to their work. Also similar to the ECFL, EALT's programs are mainly run by volunteers. And EALT has recently placed a Conservation Easement in the McGrath neighbourhood, to steward a unique natural area in the City.

Further, we can speak to the fact that the EALT has been extremely active in Edmonton's communities over the last couple of years, particularly with their *Protecting Pollinators* project, which focused on building Bee Hotels. They either conducted Bee Hotel workshops for adults and kids at many locations including community leagues, or provided at no charge, large Bee Hotels to be placed in iconic public places with educational links to their <u>website resources</u> as well as <u>materials for kids</u>. This project provided a valuable service in showing residents that they all could take action to reduce pollinator decline in their own yards.

Investing in EALT's long-term financial and organizational sustainability would be very worthwhile, besides being the intent of the CIP grant. The benefits of EALT are highly diverse and vital to the community, and they take a partnership approach to most of their work, whether with universities, youth groups and schools, other NGOs, businesses, or community leagues.

EALT intends to hire a Fund Development Coordinator, to hold board development workshops focused on fund raising, and to develop their Earth Ambassador Program which fosters connections with the local business community.

This grant would also support the EALT in recruiting and retaining more volunteers to help with stewarding and outreach, community and local volunteers being critical to their success. Plus they hope to connect local residents to nature while creating further support for the organization, and encouraging real life visits and benefits.

I would like to encourage you to assist and fund the EALT's application as their work is very important to building strong, resilient communities. Thank you for the opportunity to speak up for this important organization and its role in conserving the environment in and around the City of Edmonton.
