This is the first **time Steele Heights will field soccer teams in many years. It's an accomplishment for the single-neighbourhood community league in Edmonton's North End.**

Spray Deck at J.A. Fyfe

This year, the seven Community Leagues in Area 17 celebrated the opening of the J.A. Fife Water Park in Kilkenny. The park is a rebuild of one of the original spray decks in Edmonton. "If we lock it up the kids have nothing to do."** The community opted to leave their outdoor facilities unlocked and they have experienced high use and no major damage. I am personally very disappointed that our Federal **Government chose not to support Edmonton’s desire to bid for the World’s Fair. Although it would have undoubtedly caused some short** term problems for some District I communities, I think the opportunities and long term benefits for Edmonton would have been worth it. Development on the South Campus is moving ahead and we will continue to try to maximize the positive **opportunities and minimize the negative impacts to our communities by the University’s** growth.



The Central Area Council of Community Leagues (CACCL) is comprised of most of the Community Leagues that are included in District I and so I am able to maintain a good liaison with many of the leagues I represent through attendance at the CACCL meetings. My community, Grandview Heights, joined CACCL in 2010 and I expect that some of the other three District I leagues that are not yet members may join as well.

Over the few months that I have been a Director on the EFCL Board, I have learned a lot about the history of the EFCL and the Community League model that was adopted by **Edmonton very early in our City’s development. I have really come to appreciate how well** our Community Leagues have worked to enhance the opportunities and well being of the citizens that they serve.

I am personally very aligned with the EFCL’s “Live Local” ideology and feel it is important that we do what we can to make our communities “Urban Villages” where we can live, work , play, grow some of our own food, generate some of our own energy, and minimize the energy we need to use. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Allan Bolstad Annual Report – 2010



EFCL Enjoys a Banner Year

Put simply, the EFCL had a banner year in 2010. It's my pleasure to use this space to summarize a number of the highlights.

The year got off to a great start with our first-ever **EFCL Trade Show**, where 300 community league representatives had an opportunity to meet with a hall full of suppliers at the Blatchford Hangar at Fort Edmonton Park. Food, music and a good exchange of information were the orders of the day and the EFCL managed to show a nice profit to boot.

Later that month the federation was pleased to **Parkdale/Cromdale community league get back on its feet**. After running the league's hall for four months, the federation was most pleased to turn the keys over to a new group of people that quickly gave the league a fresh start and a new burst of energy.

In February the federation was excited to ink a **new deal with Servus** as a preferred supplier of financial services. The five-year agreement included a significant sponsorship arrangement, which will help the federation provide special events to its members for years to come.

The month of March saw us launch the **Neighborhood Speed Reduction pilot project**, which saw the speed limit reduced to 40 km/hour in six neighborhoods. The EFCL worked closely with the city in planning and implementing this exercise, which is attracting attention from cities across Canada.

The word "challenge" took on a new meaning later last spring, first with the hosting of a successful **Green Challenge** – where over 40 community leagues undertook a number of environmental initiatives in pursuit of a \$5,000 cash prize – followed by our **Community Challenge**, where we worked with the city's Next Gen committee to develop a series of activities to help leagues reach out to young people. A total of \$17,000 in sponsor-provided prize money was given away at the conclusion of this fun-filled event.

Last May also marked the first time the EFCL has hosted a meeting of the provincial cabinet, when we landed a date on their provincial tour. Approximately 150 community league representatives had an opportunity to meet and discuss issues of concern with eleven cabinet ministers and six backbench MLAs at Balwin Hall.

Last summer featured EFCL promotions at **Canada Day events and the city's Park(ed) Day**, where residents were encouraged to leave their vehicle in their garage for a day. And once again we spent the August long weekend welcoming visitors at the EFCL rest centre at **Heritage Days**, which is part of our effort to reach out to new Canadians.



EFCL staff, including planner Bev Zubot, talked to visitors about community leagues, entered names in a prize draw and ran a football toss program for kids at the Mill Woods Canada Day event.

Last summer also saw the drafting of a **Memorandum of Understanding between the federation and the city's 11 area councils** – an exercise that is helping bring all of our organization's together.

September saw the federation launch its first-ever **Community League Day**, where 90 community leagues strutted their stuff in neighborhood-based events all over town. To help draw attention to the event, the EFCL displayed a **120' by 70' quilt** at Churchill Square, featuring hand-made **5' by 5' sections from 43 community leagues**. With the name of every league on an individual square, the quilt was designed to show the location of all of the leagues in the city (split by some blue sheets snaking through the middle, depicting the North Saskatchewan River). Flushed by the success of this promotion, leagues quickly decided to make the third Saturday of each September a Community League Day tradition in Edmonton.

September also saw us host a highly successful planning workshop, where close to 40 people spent their Saturday working on designs for family-friendly, high density housing. This is a very big issue for many of our leagues, who are faced by redevelopment pressures that all too often results in the loss of young families.

In November, the federation hosted 80 community league presidents and 10 area council presidents in our first-ever **Presidents' Dinner**. The event was all about saying thank you to the presidents, for their role in running their leagues and area councils and acting as liaison between the EFCL and their organizations.

Late last fall also saw us **Reach Out To Local Artists** with a workshop at Alberta Avenue Community League. This exercise, combined with our work with new Canadians and young adults, has helped us develop a three-pronged approach to finding new members for community leagues.

Saving the best to the last, the EFCL hit one out of the park in December, when the City of Edmonton agreed to launch a **new capital infrastructure grant program** for community leagues and **boosted the annual operating grant to leagues by 40%**. This was the culmination of months of negotiations with city staff and a recognition that the leagues need a new financial deal going forward.

All told, a banner year for our group. No other way to describe it.

Many People to Thank

I'd like to take a moment to thank the key people who helped make 2010 so successful.

First the EFCL staff: **Valerie Pachal**, who is doing such a great job with our website and helping leagues build their own websites; **Linda Crosby**, who keeps our books in great shape and helps leagues do the same with theirs; **Michael Janz**, for his ingenuity and enthusiasm on our key events and sponsorship development initiatives; **Shahriyar Khan** for his leadership on our Cultural Integration initiative, the traffic speed program and many dealings with the city; **Bev Zubot** for helping the federation and many of its leagues deal with a host of thorny planning issues; summer student **Ian Clarke** for his help with our policy manual and data base; **Nancy Rempel** for the wonderful reports she has provided on community leagues in the Edmonton Examiner, on Shaw TV and CBC radio; **April Kiely** for the great job she did producing the President's Dinner event and finally **Ursula Wolsoncroft, Stephanie Hawrylak, Nancy Rempel** and in November **Joanne Booth**, for their help in welcoming the public and working with our members as front desk receptionists.

The EFCL was also blessed this year to have a great group of board members, who pour through 40-page board reports on the second Thursday of each month and provide a wealth of experience in directing our organization. A particularly big pat on the back needs to be given to **President David Gibbens**, who helps the federation work through issues on a daily basis by e-mail and at least three or four times a week in person. David has done an incredible job during his three years as president and quite frankly deserves a great big thank you by everyone in this organization at the close of his presidential tenure on April 4, 2011.

In closing I'd be remiss to not take a moment to thank the key city staff people that we have had the pleasure of working with. In case anyone hasn't noticed, everything the federation does is closely connected to city operations and our success is due in large part to the excellent working relationship we enjoy with city representatives. Heading this group is **Kathy Barnhart**, who has given up more evenings than she'd ever want to remember at EFCL meetings and her right-hand lady **Judy Smith**, who has been the point person through all of our funding and tripartite license negotiations. A special thank you so needs to go to **Linda Cochrane**, who was instrumental in connecting the federation with City Council and guiding our funding initiative.

While I hate to single out any Community Recreation Coordinators – for fear of forgetting others – I do want to point out their invaluable support in helping five new leagues get up and running in 2010 (Cameron Heights, Secord, Ellerslie, Oak Hills and Summerside). This now brings our membership to 154.

Once again, evidence of a banner year at the EFCL – in fact, one that might be a little tough to match.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

Annual Report – 2010



This report summarizes the key initiatives undertaken by the EFCL planning committee in 2010, followed by a quick rundown of the assistance we provided to individual community leagues.

Planning Committee Initiatives

1. Efforts to attract and retain families with children in mature neighbourhoods.

EFCL recognized that the number of children in mature neighbourhoods is declining. Under-utilized schools, recreation facilities and shops are at risk of being lost. Higher density infill housing has not brought more families to mature neighbourhoods, partly because the housing has not been child friendly.

To address these concerns, a special group was formed and a successful Family Friendly Multi-Unit Housing Workshop was held. As a result, EFCL drafted Child/Family Friendly multi-unit Housing Guidelines which were used to advocate for zoning changes. In addition, EFCL developed a number of other strategies to retain and attract families with children to mature neighbourhoods; strategies which will be pursued in the coming year.

2. Input that helped shape a number of city housing and land development policies in 2010. The following list represents some of the more significant ones:

a) Zoning Bylaw changes to create a more compact city

EFCL dedicated significant time evaluating city proposals to amend the Zoning Bylaw in order to create higher density housing. EFCL advocated for regulations which would create quality dwellings and neighbourhoods.

- i) **Row Housing:** Thanks to the persistence of the EFCL Planning Committee and the Board, the City took the recommendations of EFCL seriously and moderated the requests of the development industry when approving a new row housing zone and new regulations for the existing zone. As requested by EFCL, the new regulations require treed boulevards when front yards are small, and 30 m² rear yards are still required within the old RF5 row housing zone. However, we were not able to make backyard space a requirement for the new row housing zone. EFCL had also insisted that all row housing zones be family-oriented. The family-oriented requirement was retained for the RF5 zone but it was not made a requirement for the new Urban Character Row Housing Zone. On the positive side, as a result of our intervention, **Council did pass a motion that Administration review the issue of "family friendly" design in the Zoning Bylaw and report back to Executive Committee by June 2011.**

ii) **Medium Scale Residential Infill Overlay** regulations are being drafted by the City to ensure quality medium scale (primarily low-rise apartment) infill housing in mature neighbourhoods. EFCL has given much attention to the proposed Overlay because it could be an important tool for mature neighbourhoods. EFCL has been encouraging the drafting of recommendations which ensure the creation of family-oriented units, ground level outdoor recreation space, enhanced landscaping, and increased side yards for the protection of the use and enjoyment of the existing small scale housing next to the medium scale infill.

iii) **Transit-Oriented Development Guidelines** are being developed by the city to encourage higher density, mixed use, pedestrian oriented developments around LRT stations and major Transit Stations. EFCL participated in the stakeholder workshops organized by the city, and encouraged league representatives to attend the TOD Information and Feedback Session in December.

b) Healthy integration of social housing and affordable housing: EFCL drafted housing policy positions which support the distribution of social and affordable housing throughout the city rather than over concentrating them in any given neighborhood.

Notably, for the first time, EFCL and Community Leagues were invited by the Homeward Trust Community Plan Committee to participate in developing a housing and supportive service plan for Edmonton.

c) Light Efficient Community Policy: The EFCL, along with a group of artificial lighting experts, developed a draft light efficient community policy which would reduce energy consumption, light pollution and light trespassing, while maintaining the appropriate lighting for safety. After presenting our draft policy to Council, City Administration was directed to work with EFCL and other partners to develop a city Light Efficient Community Policy. The EFCL President is co-chairing the group working on the artificial lighting policy for city lands.

3. Promotion of improved community consultation. This included the following:

a) Early release of city reports: EFCL supported a city procedural change which now allows community leagues and all citizens to request an early release of a city report prior to it being considered by City Council. This gives leagues and citizens more time to be better prepared to present their position to Council.

b) Consultation Forms: Upon the initiation of EFCL, a pre-application consultation form has been created for developers to use when consulting neighbours and community leagues in mature neighbourhoods. We will be evaluating its implementation in the coming year.

c) Community league voice in city-wide planning matters: Nearly every District was represented on the EFCL Planning and Development Committee in 2010. The broad city representation was important in developing city-wide policy positions. Thanks to the broad participation and diligent work of the Planning Committee members and the EFCL Board, EFCL had a noticeable impact on land development policy in 2010, and we hope to do even better next year.

In the coming year, the Planning Committee representatives aim to strengthen communication with the District/Area Councils as a means of engaging more Leagues in the many exciting conversations about urban development policies which impact our neighbourhoods.

5. Assistance to Individual Community Leagues

The vast majority of new housing in 2010 was in new neighbourhoods, rather than infill; however, some central neighbourhoods felt redevelopment pressures and requested the assistance of the EFCL. For example, a couple of leagues sought assistance in opposing high rise apartments, and in interpreting the new Top of Bank Policy. One league was successful in resisting an unwanted high-rise, which in their opinion, was in an inappropriate location.

Other leagues asked for help in shaping social housing projects, home business developments, duplexes and garage suites. The vast majority of the developments were approved at the SDAB Hearings; however, in several cases, conditions requested by the community league were added to the development permit or agreed upon by the developer prior to the Hearing.

1. Cultural Integration Project

The project was initiated in 2009, as a way of welcoming people from ethno- cultures and Aboriginal community, into the community league movement.

A) The following were some key activities of the EFCL in 2010:

- Sharing of community league information with Immigrant Serving Agencies, Immigrant Groups and Associations, and through them helped promote community leagues to newcomers.
- Made a number of presentations about community leagues to immigrant groups, associations, and community.
- Initiated consultation between Immigrant Serving Agencies and immigrant associations, and Community Leagues
- Formed partnership between the EFCL and Aboriginal Liaison Office of the City of Edmonton
- Formed partnership between the EFCL and Multicultural Coalition
- **Engaged in consultations with resources interested in the EFCL's WE ALL CAN PLAY Program** (A free soccer program for refugee children).
- Presented WE ALL CAN PLAY at Youth Development through Recreation and Sports Symposium at Banff.
- Negotiated with a number of potential funders for WE ALL CAN PLAY PROGRAM
- Worked closely with Diversity and Inclusion, department of the City of Edmonton
- Worked closely with Northerners: A group of agencies providing support for newcomers in northeast Edmonton.

B). Some key achievements are as follows:

- Increased awareness among new Canadian about community leagues and their programs
- Some leagues have now providing free memberships to newcomer families, and free soccer registration for immigrant children
- Immigrant Serving Agencies are becoming places of advocacy for community leagues
- Immigrant associations and groups are promoting leagues to their communities
- Immigrant serving agencies and leagues are beginning to form partnerships

- Immigrant Serving Agencies are hiring community facilitators to help new immigrant community involve in their respective community.
- A number of agencies are willing to partner in WE ALL CAN PLAY program
- **We're starting to see some representation from ethnic communities on league boards**

2. 40 K. M/hr Speed Limit Pilot Project

Traffic Safety on residential areas is a key priority of the EFCL. During 2010 we partnered with the Office of Traffic Safety on a number of traffic safety initiatives, including the 40 K.M/hr pilot project in six neighborhoods. The six participating communities are Beverly Heights, King Edward Park, Ottewell, West Ridge, Woodcroft, and Twin Brooks. Neighborhoods were selected on the basis of speeding and accident statistics and complaints from area residents.



Some other programs that the EFCL worked on were:

- Pace Car Program
- Speed Watch Program
- Community Safe Speed Van
- Edmonton Annual International Conference on Urban Safety

3. Community Swim

The City is in the process of reviewing its pool rental procedures in an attempt to ensure that all times are well used and reduce administrative costs. In this respect the City wants to streamline the community league swim process. The EFCL facilitated a number of community consultations sessions on the issue. As a result of these consultations, South West community leagues have now a new pool rental agreement with Confederation and Terwillegar Community Recreation Centre. Consultations with the City will continue until a final agreement is reached.

4. Community Ice

In March 2010, the newly formed Community Ice Allocation Committee allocated ice slots for 2010-2011 to various community leagues. Also the EFCL remained an active member of the Arena User Committee, and took part in important decisions relevant to ice use in the City facilities.

5. Gym Allocation

During 2010 the EFCL continuously raised community leagues concerns with respect to Gym allocation to leagues. We are still negotiating with the Gym User Committee. provided not for profit sector an opportunity to learn leadership skills and connect with different City wide resources.

6. Board Leadership

The EFCL extended its full help and support to the Planning Committee for Board Leadership 2010. Held at the Grant MacEwan University, the conference was a great success that provided not for profit sector an opportunity to learn leadership skills and connect with different City wide resources.

7. Partnership with Capital City Clean Up

The EFCL continued to support and promote Capital City Clean Up Programs during 2010. This included the following:

- 15 to Clean Challenge
- Big Bin Events
- Cigarette Litter Reduction
- Community Bin Grants
- Community Mural Matching Grants
- Graffiti Wipe Outs



THE EDMONTON MINOR HOCKEY ASSOCIATION CORPORATE FEE

EFCL has diligently attempted to assist the Edmonton Minor Hockey Association with the management of Community League Membership Sales over a number of years. Five years ago we implemented generic cards provided and funded by EFCL. However, the hockey registrars still experienced difficulties with the distribution of cards and funds to leagues. Three years ago the EFCL stepped in to help with the distribution process and still the system was fraught with late payments, stale dated cheques, and families who did not get their cards for other league activities. This year a last ditch effort was made to salvage our special relationship with the hockey association and we took on the Corporate Rate Fee.

EFCL spent over \$50,000 in staff time on this process in 2010, in addition to covering off some of the financial discrepancies between cards sold and dollars received from hockey. Unfortunately, some hockey families did not receive their cards in a timely fashion and communications to the leagues, the hockey registrars, and the families were inconsistent and few people knew how to expedite the membership process.

In addition, Edmonton Minor Hockey does not have accounting systems in place to adequately manage any fees collected outside of their own fees.

In summary, the Edmonton Minor Hockey Association volunteers have more than enough on their plate with taking care of their own registrations. There simply are no resources left to put toward the sale of Community League Membership sales and leagues will have to manage their own sales into the future.

My activities were significantly constrained this year because of the huge time commitment involved with this project. I thank the leagues who were kind, patient, and accommodating of their hockey families. They made my job easier.

FINANCIAL SERVICES REPORT

Annual Report – 2010



This past year I have experienced a huge increase in administrative and accounting tasks due to the demands of the corporate membership purchases through the EMHA hockey. As a result, we made some changes in how we provide volunteer training to the leagues.

Overall treasurer training – all treasurers were asked to read/study the online tutorial in the Financial section of the Community League Resource Guide. Those requesting one on one training were given so on a first come, first serve basis.

1. Individual assistance was given to thirty three (33) community leagues in 2010.

These numbers were slightly down from 2009, as some leagues found what they needed in the online tutorial and the shortage of appointment time made it difficult to fit in all of the requests for training.

2. Requests for assistance generally came forward in the following areas:

- a) Accounting software training in both Simply accounting and Quick Books. The majority of community leagues request training in these areas and much has been given through phone inquiries.
- b) Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission license applications and financial reporting assistance to complete Bingo and Casino applications and reports. The completion of gaming reports is an ongoing challenge to community leagues, as it must be done annually.
- c) Annual budget preparations for presentation and approval by community league members at Annual General Meetings. Assistance to leagues in this area was often done by e-mailing basic budget templates.
- d) Cash flow projection templates for community league executives, to help them set goals for the upcoming year.
- e) Bookkeeper training for the community leagues that have contracted bookkeeper services.
- f) Help with preparing year end financial statements, to reduce costs of annual Audit, Financial Review and Notice To Reader costs.
- g) Helped leagues work with Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission auditors.
- h) Assistance was given to member community leagues filing one time GST Rebate applications to Canada Customs and Excise Tax.
- i) Assistance was provided to several community leagues in filing outstanding Annual Returns to Corporate Registry.

1. NATURE OF ORGANIZATION

The Edmonton Federation of Community Leagues (the "Federation") was established in 1921 and, as a non-profit organization, is exempt from income taxes. The Federation exists to continually improve the efficiency and effectiveness of member organizations in their effort to deliver community programs, by providing leadership as well as operational and administrative support.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared by management in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles. The precise determination of many assets and liabilities is dependent on future events. As a result, the preparation of financial statements for a period involves the use of estimates and approximations which have been made using careful judgement. Actual results could differ from those estimates and approximations. The financial statements have, in management's opinion, been properly prepared within reasonable limits of materiality and within the framework of the accounting policies below:

Property and equipment

Property and equipment are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided over the estimated useful lives of the assets at the following methods and rates:

Office equipment	20%	declining balance method
Computer equipment	30%	declining balance method
Computer software	100%	declining balance method
Leasehold improvements	10 years	straight-line method
Website	10 years	straight-line method

Donated Goods and Services

Volunteers donate time to assist the Federation in carrying out its services. Due to the difficulty in determining their fair value, donated goods and services are not recognized in the financial statements.

Revenue Recognition

The Federation follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue during the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when the amount to be received or receivable can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Membership dues are recognized as revenue in the year to which they relate.

Investment income is recognized as revenue when earned.

3. RESTRICTED CASH

Cash balances received from casinos and government grant funding totalling \$330,236 (2009 - \$82,207) are available for use only in accordance with the terms of the related agreements.

10. CAPITAL MANAGEMENT

The Federation's goal in managing capital is to safeguard its ability to continue as a going concern so that it can continue to provide services to the members. To accomplish this goal, policies have been established to preserve the financial condition of the Federation and protect its assets by setting limitations on the expenditure funds, incurrence of debt, use of any long-term reserves and investment of funds. Over the year, the Board meets with the Executive Director to review the Federation's financial position.
